

Course of Study

Period 1: 1491-1607:

North America before the arrival of Columbus to the establishment of Jamestown colony by the English.

Period 2: 1607-1754:

Establishment of Jamestown to the start of the French and Indian War (AKA the Seven Years War)

Period 3: 1754-1800:

The French and Indian War to the election of 1800 (election of Thomas Jefferson)

Period 4: 1800-1848:

Election of Jefferson to the end of the Mexican American War

Period 5: 1844-1877

Manifest Destiny and the Mexican American War through the Civil War and Reconstruction

Period 6: 1865-1898

Reconstruction, the Gilded Age and the Spanish American War

Period 7: 1890-1945

The Progressive Era, World War I, The 1920s and Great Depression, World War II

Period 8: 1945-1980

Start of the Cold War, Korean War and the 1950s, Civil Rights Movements, Vietnam, Watergate, the 1970s and the rise of conservatism


Period 9 1980 - present:


The 1980s, end of the Cold War, 1990s and the Obama Presidency
